Title:	The English Indices of Deprivation 2015			
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Audience:	Investment Strategy Team			
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#### 1. Introduction

On the 30<sup>th</sup> September 2015 Department for Communities Local Government released the Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) 2015. The Index of Multiple Deprivation 2015 combines a number of indicators, chosen to cover a range of economic, social and housing issues, into a single deprivation score for each small area in England. This allows each area to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation. As with the previous releases, the Indices of Deprivation 2015 has been produced at Lower Super Output Area level (LSOA's), of which there are 32,844 in the country. Please note: All data used to calculate the IMD 2015 is from 2012/13.

#### 2. Key National Headlines

The IMD 2015 results show that:

- 83% of neighbourhoods that are most deprived according to the 2015 IMD were also most deprived in the 2010 Index.
- 61% of all Local Authorities have at least one of the 10% most deprived LSOA's nationally.
- Blackpool, Knowsley, City of Kingston Upon Hull, Liverpool and Manchester are ranked as the top 5 most deprived local authorities nationally.

## 3. LCR Local Authority Rankings

Wirral is currently ranked 66<sup>th</sup> most deprived out of 326 local authorities as shown by the 'Rank of average score' column in Table 1 below. Wirral was previously ranked 60<sup>th</sup> most deprived in the IMD 2010 and has therefore moved up 6 places in the 2015 IMD rankings<sup>1</sup>. Knowsley is the 2<sup>nd</sup> and Liverpool is the 4<sup>th</sup> most deprived LAs nationally, and Sefton is the least deprived in the city region at 76th most deprived nationally. Liverpool City Region is the most deprived LEP nationally.

#### 4. Wirral Analysis

There are 206 LSOA's in Wirral, 44 of which are ranked in the top 10% nationally this is 21% of Wirral's total LSOAs, this is 4 fewer LSOAs than in 2010. Wirral's most deprived LSOA is 7122 which is the St James's church area of Birkenhead and ranks 36<sup>th</sup> most deprived nationally (previously 24<sup>th</sup> in 2010). Wirral has 20 LSOA's ranked in the 3% most deprived nationally, this equates to 10% of the total LSOA's in the borough. Table 2 shows that in the borough, there are significantly more LSOA's which fall in the 10% most deprived compared to those in the 10% least deprived nationally, the increase of LSOAs in the least deprived 10% in 2015 highlights the continuing stark contrasts within the borough.



60% (124) of LSOA's in Wirral have improved their ranking position since the IMD 2010, whilst 40% (82) of the LSOA's have deteriorated in their ranking since IMD 2010.

Map 1 shows those LSOA's in the borough which are ranked in the top and bottom 10% of deprived areas nationally.

## 5. Employment Domain

In the 2010 IMD Wirral was ranked 10<sup>th</sup> worst nationally for employment deprivation; this has since improved to 25<sup>th</sup> in the 2015 update, a ranking improvement of 15 places. However, Wirral now has **the most employment deprived LSOA in the country**, this is LSOA 7133 which is located adjacent to Morpeth Dock and is the Birkenhead Park / East Float area. In the 2010 IMD this LSOA was ranked 5<sup>th</sup> nationally and has therefore slipped 4 places. LSOA 7126 which is the Morpeth Dock area of Birkenhead was ranked as 4<sup>th</sup> most deprived nationally in 2010 – this has now moved to a ranking of 73<sup>rd</sup> nationally, with 5 other Wirral LSOAs now falling below this ranking.

Table 3 shows as well as Wirral improving its national position for overall employment deprivation, there are also now fewer LSOA's which fall in the 10% most deprived nationally. In 2010 Wirral had 63 LSOAs in the 10% most deprived nationally; in 2015 Wirral has 53%, this is a 16% reduction. 83% of all LSOA's in the borough have seen an improvement in their LSOA employment deprivation ranking since 2010.



## 6. Income Domain

In the 2010 IMD Wirral was ranked 22<sup>nd</sup> nationally for income deprivation; this has since improved to 51<sup>st</sup> in the 2015 update, a ranking improvement of 29 places. However, Wirral now has **the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> most income deprived LSOAs in the country**, again this LSOA is 7133 which is located adjacent to Morpeth Dock and is the Birkenhead Park / East Float area. In the 2010 IMD this LSOA was ranked 42<sup>nd</sup> nationally and has therefore slipped 33 places. LSOA 7122 which is the St James area of Birkenhead was ranked as 12<sup>th</sup> most deprived nationally in 2010 – this has now moved to a ranking of 10<sup>th</sup> nationally, so whilst this LSOA has not seen a significant change in ranking there has been a further decline in an already deprived area.


Table 3 shows as well as Wirral improving its national position for overall income deprivation, there are also now fewer LSOA's which fall in the 3% and 5% most deprived LSOAs nationally. The number in the 10% most deprived nationally has stayed the same since 2010 at 44 LSOAs. Wirral also now has 4 more LSOAs which are in the 10% least deprived LSOAs nationally. 58% of all LSOA's in the borough have seen an improvement in their LSOA income deprivation ranking since 2010.

# 7. Definitions of Local Authority Rankings categories in Tables 1

Average rank of scores	Describes overall ranking of the LA using the average deprivation score for each LSOA
Average rank of ranks	Describes the overall ranking of the LA using average rank of all LSOAs.
Local Concentration	This identifies the level of the Wirral's "hotspots" of deprivation as measured by the average ranking of the most deprived 10% LSOAs
Extent	This describes how widespread high levels of deprivation are in the borough.
Income	Measures the number of people in the borough who are income deprived.
Employment	Measures the number of people in the borough who are employment deprived.
